# AN ORDINANCE

## Relating to Quarantine.

BE it ordained by Sir William Hill Irvine, Deputy of the Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Arrets I General of the Commonwealth of Australia, with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the New Guinea Act 1920, as follows :-

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Quarantine Ordinance 1921. Short title.

2. This Ordinance shall continue in force only until the thirty- Duration of first day of March, One thousand nine hundred and twenty-two.

3. Notwithstanding anything contained in the Quarantine Act Powers of Administrator. 1908-1920 of the Commonwealth of Australia as applied to the Territory by the Laws Repeal and Adopting Ordinance 1921, the Administrator may by Proclamation published in the New Guinea Gazette-

- (a) appoint temporary Quarantine Officers whose appointment shall have effect only within the boundaries of the Territory and who shall exercise the powers of the Quarantine Act only within the boundaries of the Territory;
- (b) appoint any place to be a temporary Quarantine Station for such period as he thinks necessary for the performance of quarantine by any vessel, person or goods, and the place so appointed shall be deemed to be a Quarantine Station accordingly;
- (c) prescribe the measures for regulating or preventing ingress to the Territory from Dutch New Guinea or Papua in so far as such measures are necessary to prevent the introduction of quarantinable disease into the Territory;
- (d) declare that any part of the Territory, in which any quarantinable disease exists, shall be a quarantine area and declare that any vessel, person or goods in any quarantine area shall be subject to quarantine;
- (e) prescribe measures for regulating or preventing ingress to or egress from any quarantine area and for regulating or preventing the removal of mails or goods from any quaran-

tine area; and (f) prescribe measures of quarantine within any quarantine area.

# AN ORDINANCE

## To amend the Darwin Town Council Ordinance 1915-1921 and for other purposes.

**B**<sup>E</sup> it ordained by the Deputy of the Governor-General, in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution, with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the Northern Territory Acceptance Act 1910–1919, and the Northern Territory (Administration) Act 1910, as follows :---

Short title and citation.

1.-(1.) This Ordinance may be cited as the Darwin Town Council Ordinance (No. 3) 1921.

(2.) Sub-section (4.) of section one of the Darwin Town Council Ordinance (No. 2) 1921 is hereby repealed.

(3.) The Darwin Town Council Ordinance 1915-1918, as amended by the Darwin Town Council Ordinance 1921 and by the Darwin Town Council Ordinance (No. 2) 1921, is in this Ordinance referred to as the Principal Ordinance.

(4.) The Principal Ordinance, as amended by this Ordinance, may be cited as the *Darwin Town Council Ordinance* 1915-1921.

2. Section four of the Principal Ordinance is amended by

Definitions.

Constitution of Town Council.

Qualifications of members of the Council. 3. Section eight of the Principal Ordinance is repealed and the following section inserted in its stead :--

omitting the definitions of "Appointed member" and "Elected member".

"8. The Council shall consist of five members elected by the electors in the manner prescribed.".

4. Section nine of the Principal Ordinance is amended-

- (a) by omitting from sub-section (1.) the words ", who, at the date of nomination, has lived in the area comprised in the town for twelve months continuously,"; and
- (b) by omitting from sub-section (2.) the words "an elected member" and inserting in their stead the words "a member".

5. Section ten of the Principal Ordinance is repealed and the following section inserted in its stead :---

"10. The term of service of members of the Council shall commence on the first day of July next following their election, and shall, subject to this Ordinance, continue for two years.".

6. Section eleven of the Principal Ordinance is repealed.

7. Section twelve of the Principal Ordinance is amended-

(a) by omitting the words "elected or appointed "; and(b) by omitting the words "or re-appointment".

8. Section thirteen of the Principal Ordinance is amended by omitting the words "an elected or appointed member" and inserting in their stead the words "a member".

"14.—(1.) If, at the time at which notice of the annual day of nomination is given, there is a vacancy existing in the Council, or if, after the time at which that notice is given, and before the

annual election, a vacancy occurs in the Council and the provisions of this section can be carried out consistently with those of section sixty-one of this Ordinance, there shall not be a supplementary election to fill the vacancy but it shall be filled at the annual election.

(2.) Those candidates, to the required number, who obtain the highest numbers of votes at the annual election shall be deemed to be elected to fill the seats which become vacant by rotation in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance and the remaining elected candidate shall be deemed to be elected to fill the vacancy mentioned in the last preceding sub-section.

"(3.) In the event of two or more elected candidates obtaining an equal number of votes, the returning officer shall, by drawing lots, decide which of those candidates is to be deemed, for the purposes of this section, to have obtained the greatest number of votes, and which the next to the greatest number, and so on as the case requires.

(4.) If two or more such vacancies as mentioned in subsection (1.) of this section have to be filled, the seat of the Councillor who had the longest unexpired term of office still to run shall be filled by such of the candidates elected to fill those vacancies as obtained the highest number of votes, and so on as the case requires.

"(5.) Any person elected to fill a vacancy under this section shall, subject to this Ordinance, hold office for the remainder of the term for which his predecessor in office was elected.

"(6.) For the purposes of this section "vacancy" means a vacancy in the office of a councillor who is not due to retire by. rotation on the thirtieth day of June in the year in which the election is held.".

10. Section seventeen of the Principal Ordinance is amended-

- (a) by omitting from sub-section (1.) the words "an elected and inserting in their stead the words "a member member"; and
- (b) by omitting from that sub-section the words " for the office of an appointed member of the Council" and inserting in their stead the words " (except that contained in paragraph (a) of sub-section (2.) of section nine) for the office of a member of the Council".

11. Section nineteen of the Principal Ordinance is repealed and the following section inserted in its stead :---

"19. Subject to the disqualifications hereafter set out, all Persons entitled to vote persons resident in the town not under twenty-one years of age, at whether male or female, married or unmarried-

(a) who are natural-born or naturalized British subjects;

(b) who are ratepayers of the Council; and

(c) whose names are on the electoral roll for the Council,

shall be entitled to vote at elections of members of the Council and auditors".

12. Section sixty-one of the Principal Ordinance is amended-

(a) by omitting sub-section (1.) and inserting in its stead the following sub-section :-

"(1.) Subject to section fourteen of this Ordinance whenever- Supplementary election to be

- (a) an annual election wholly or partly fails to be held upon held in certain cases. the day appointed by this Ordinance; or
- (b) an annual election, having been duly held, becomes wholly or partly void; or
- (c) an extraordinary vacancy occurs in the office of a councillor,
- a supplementary election shall be held.";
- (b) by inserting in sub-section (5.) after the word "election" (first occurring) the words ", held on account of the failure or avoidance of an annual election,"; and

(c) by adding at the end thereof the following sub-sections :-

(6.) A councillor elected at a supplementary election held in order to fill an extraordinary vacancy shall, subject to this Ordinance, hold office only from the date of his election and until the expiration of the period for which his predecessor in office was elected.

"(7.) For the purposes of this section 'extraordinary vacancy' means a vacancy caused otherwise than by the retirement of a councillor by rotation as provided in this Ordinance:

Provided that if, at the time at which notice of the annual day of nomination is given, the office of a councillor, who is due to retire on the thirtieth day of June in the year in which the annual election is to be held, is vacant, or if, after the time at which that notice is given, and before the annual election, a vacancy occurs in any such office, the vacancy shall not be deemed to be an extraordinary vacancy.".

13. Section sixty-five of the Principal Ordinance is amended by omitting the word "elected".

14. Section seventy-five of the Principal Ordinance is amended by omitting the word "four" (wherever occurring) and inserting in its stead the word "three".

- (a) an election for three councillors shall take place during the month of October, One thousand nine hundred and twenty-one;
- (b) the nomination of the councillors for the election to be held in pursuance of this section, and the poll in relation to that election, shall take place and be held on such dates, during the month of October. One thousand nine hundred and twenty-one, as are appointed by the Administrator by notice in the *Gazette* of the Northern Territory, but otherwise Part IV. (except Division 2 thereof) of the *Darwin Town Council Ordinance* 1915-1921 shall apply in relation to the election to be held under this section as if it were an election held under that Ordinance; and
- (c) the term of service of the councillors elected at the election held in pursuance of this section shall commence on the first day of November, One thousand nine hundred and twenty-one and shall, unless sooner terminated in pursuance of the *Darwin Town Council Ordinance* 1915-1921, cease on the thirtieth day of June, One thousand nine hundred and twenty-three.

(2.) The electoral roll shall contain as nearly as possible the names of all persons eligible as electors on the first day of September, One thousand nine hundred and twenty-one.

(3.) Upon the compilation of the electoral roll, the roll or a copy thereof shall be open to public inspection at the Council office.

(4.) The provisions of sections twenty-three to twenty-seven (inclusive) of the *Darwin Town Council Ordinance* 1915–1921 shall apply in relation to the electoral roll compiled in accordance with this section with the modification that for the words "June in every year" there shall be substituted the words "October, One thousand nine hundred and twenty-one".

- (a) by omitting from paragraph (b) the words "thirtieth day of (2) 1921. September" and inserting in their stead the words "thirty-first day of October"; September "
- (b) by omitting from paragraph (c) the words "members of the Council and "
- (c) by omitting from paragraph (c) the words "members and";
- (d) by omitting from paragraph (c) the words "thirtieth day of September "and inserting in their stead the words "thirtyfirst day of October ";
- (e) by omitting from paragraph (c) the words "during the month of September" and inserting in their stead the words "during the month of October"; and
- (f) by omitting paragraphs (d) and (e) and inserting in their stead the following paragraphs :-
  - " (d) the nomination of auditor for the election to be held in pursuance of the last preceding paragraph, and the poll in relation to such election, shall take place and be held on such dates, during the month of October, One thousand nine hundred and twenty-one, as are appointed by the Administrator by notice in the Gazette of the Northern Territory, but otherwise Part IV. (except Division 2 thereof) of the Darwin Town Council Ordinance 1915-1921 shall apply in relation to the election to be held under this section as if it were an election held under that Ordinance'; and
  - (e) the term of service of the auditor elected at the election held in pursuance, of this section shall commence on the first day of November next following his election, and shall, unless sooner terminated in pursuance of the Darwin Town Council Ordinance 1915-1921, cease on the thirtieth day of June, One thousand nine hundred and twenty-two."

  (9) Where a successful candidate does not reside within a reasonable distance of a suburban office at which the vacancy exists, the Commissioner reserves the right to appoint another boy, who, though having obtained less marks at the examination. resides in closer proximity
- marks at the examination, resides in closer proximity to the post-office referred to.
- (10) If a successful candidate decline to accept an appointment offered to him, or fail to reply within seven days to a communication from the Commissioner or a Public Service Inspector, respecting his nomination to the Public Service, his name may be removed from the "Register of Qualified Candidates."
- (11) Should a successful candidate change his address, he should immediately notify the Secretary, Commonwealth Public Service Commissioner, Customs-house, Melbourne.



A PPLICATIONS will be received from persons qualified for appointment to the positions for appointment to the positions specified below.

Applicants outside the Public Service are eligible for appointment to (1) the Administrative Division, (2) the Pro-fessional Division, and (3) to the General Division where indicated, but are not eligible for appointment to the Clerical Division unless qualified under the provisions of the Public Service Act.

Applications must be in the applicant's handwriting, should show fully qualifications for the position sought, and must, to insure consideration, be forwarded to the Public Service Inspector in the State in which the vacancy exists in time to reach the office of the Public Service Inspector not later than the date shown in each case.

In the case of officers of the Commonwealth Public Service applications should be forwarded through the Department to which the officer is attached.

In the case of applicants who are officers of the Public Service of the Commonwealth or of a State the following par-ticulars should be set out at the foot of the application:—

Designation Designation Office or Branch ..... Age last birthday (in years) ..... Length of service (in years) ..... Salary (per annum) ..... Date of receipt of present salary.....

Applicants from outside the Service should state full name and date and year of birth, also place of birth and whether they are natural-born or naturalized British subjects. Copies only of diplomas, references, testimonials, or certificates should be forwarded. If the originals are required they will be asked for.

Fares to locality of appointment of persons appointed from outside the Service will not be paid by the Commonwealth unless such fare exceeds £3, when such allowance as the cir-cumstances justify may be granted.

The range of salary indicates the classified value of a posi-tion, but appointments may be made at any salary within such range. Cost of living allowances are subject to review by the Arbitration Court from time to time. Successful ap-pointees must comply with the life assurance provisions of the Public Service Act and Regulations.

Officers promoted to positions in the Fourth Class, which come within the scope of the award of the Australian Com-monwealth Public Service Clerical Association, may be retained at the salary of £245 where, in the opinion of the Acting Commissioner, the fixing of that salary as a maximum is justified.

Officers who may be transferred without promotion or in-crease of salary, as the result of an application for an adver-tised vacancy, will be required to pay their own expenses of removal unless the transfer comes within the conditions pre-scribed in Public Service Regulation No. 54.

Particulars of existing quarters are furnished merely for the information of officers. It is not incumbent on Depart-ments to provide quarters, which, if provided, may be wholly or partially withdrawn at any time.
